

ALUMNUS OF THE MONTH



MPM alumnus Obed Kambasu from Uganda has graduated from the Program in 2016. We lost sight of him, but just recently found out that he was granted a DAAD scholarship to pursue a PhD at WIPCAD, University of Potsdam. "Completing a PhD is particularly important for me as it will expose me to cutting-edge research methodology, and equip me with the valuable skills needed to run a research-based think-tank. A PhD from Germany will also be a big boost for my profile as I apply for consultancy contracts from governments and reputable international organizations," says Obed.

In Uganda, Obed is currently working as a program manager at Restless Development. He also started the process of registering a private think-tank, that aims at conducting research and providing data-driven advisory services on effective utilization of Africa's huge human resource potential. In his PhD research, Obed will focus on the question of employer attractiveness and employer branding: What motivates people to work for the government?

SITE VISIT WITH THE NORWEGIAN PRIME MINISTER

Our first Site Visit took place at the famous Hotel Adlon in Berlin on the invitation of the Körber Foundation. MPM students of the cohort of 2018/2019 were invited to join the Körber Global Leaders Dialogue. The foundation follows the approach that foreign policy means dialogue. "Whether it is on the parliamentary and diplomatic working level or between heads of states and political leaders: without dialogue, international cooperation is not possible." (See: www.koerber-stiftung.de) With the format of a Global Leaders Dialogue, the Körber Foundation aims to contribute to this process on a regular basis.

This time the foundation invited Erna Solberg, Prime Minister of the Kingdom of Norway to deliver a speech on key security policy challenges Norway and Europe are facing today, including relations with Russia and the role of NATO. Solberg is serving as Prime Minster since October 2013 and is leading Norway's Conservative Party. With this first Site Visit MPM students were able to get a first glance of the concept of extracurricular activities offered by the MPM Office. Next on the agenda: Bundesrat, World Bank, GIZ, GPPi, and many more!

After starting his career with the German Development Institute (DIE), he worked many years for the German Foundation for International Development (DSE) as Head of the Area Orientation Centre. In this capacity he travelled to many countries all over the world. In 1999, he was elected Chairman of the Bonn Chapter of the Society for International Development (SID). His teaching assignments at the University of Potsdam covered the topics of Technical Cooperation and Civil Society Development Cooperation. His course "Social Security" was an integral part of the MPM curriculum and very popular among the MPM students and many others.

Our condolences go to Prof. Oldenbruch's family, who was so kind to welcome the MPM students to their home in the framework of the MPM Study Tour since 2013. Prof. Oldenbruch was part of the MPM family and he will be dearly missed.
